

Welcome From The DC Labor FilmFest Co-Chairs

Bigger, better, earlier. The DC Labor FilmFest marks our 14th year by anchoring the first-ever DC LaborFest, a month-long celebration of labor arts during the month of May.

With over 30 events, the DC festival of labor arts joins LaborFests around the world, including San Francisco, Tokyo, Osaka, Buenos Aires, Argentina, El Alto, Bolivia, Capetown, South Africa, Istanbul and Ankara, Turkey. More than ever, the need to build local, national and international solidarity is critical for labor to confront the challenges we face on all fronts today; LaborFests help bring our struggles together in art, film, theater, music and poetry.

In addition to the 14th annual DC Labor FilmFest – a collection of audience favorites from previous FilmFest editions – the LaborFest includes an art exhibition on organizer/painter Ralph Fassanella at the Smithsonian's American Art Museum, two labor-themed plays, local organizer/singer Joe Uehlein's birthday tribute to Pete Seeger, the AFL-CIO Book Club, a screening of the 1936 Mexican film masterpiece Redes, accompanied by a live performance of the film's score by the PostClassical Ensemble (members of AFM 161-710), a labor poetry event at Busboys and Poets, and local labor history tours, all kicking off with a May Day wreath-laying in honor of legendary labor organizer Mary Harris "Mother" Jones' 184th birthday. We're also very pleased that the DC Labor FilmFest helped coordinate the second annual Global Labor Film Festival this year, in which a dozen labor film festivals around the world coordinated screenings of labor films during the month of May to showcase the growing worldwide scope of film festivals focused on films about work, workers and their issues. And this fall, we'll host the fourth annual International Conference of Labor Film Festival Organizers as that network continues to solidify and expand.

Moving the Labor FilmFest to May and expanding it into the DC LaborFest barely six months after the 2013 FilmFest might have seemed risky but we were confident that bringing in more labor arts was the right thing to do, and the enthusiastic response of our sponsors has been gratifying and truly inspiring. 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DIRECTOR'S NOTES

Chris Garlock, DC Labor FilmFest Director

With the expansion of the DC Labor FilmFest into the multi-art LaborFest, selecting a handful of choice favorites is even more challenging than usual: only the best made the cut.

Which means that the good news is that whatever LaborFest events you choose to attend, you're guaranteed to be amazed, inspired and entertained. The bad news is that – unless you can free up the goodly chunk of time you'd need to get to over 30 different events – you do have to make some choices.

AND THE STATE OF T

With that in mind, here are a few of my top picks in each category:

ART: The Diego Rivera exhibit at the Mexican Cultural Institute is terrific but I have to give the nod here to the historic RALPH FASANELLA SHOW at the American Art Museum, a rare chance to see key works from an amazing career that spanned 52 years. Catch our free May 2nd noontime screening (page 25) of the 22-minute film Fasanella and then catch the exhibition discussion (also free; see page 35) that night at 6:30 pm with curator Leslie Umberger and donor Marc Fasanella at the museum.

THEATER: This is an easy choice: Lumina Studio Theatre's presentation of BROTHER HAL, a contemporary adaptation of Shakespeare's HENRY V, performed by a cast of actors ages 13-18. Brother Hal will be performed the first two weekend in May but you won't want to miss the special May 9 performance, which features special appearances by AFL-CIO president Richard Trumka and Metro Washington Council AFL-CIO president Jos Williams. If you can, pair Brother Hal with Sweet Joan of the Textile Mills, in which by Lumina Studio Theatre's youngest actors (ages 8-10) examine the plight of child labor, inspired by ideas and plot by Bertolt Brecht.

HISTORY: Tough one, as they're all really interesting. So I'll punt on this one by simply noting that three of the six are brand-new: the May 1 MOTHER JONES WREATH-LAYING (page 31), the IRON WORKERS HISTORY TOUR (page 29) and the BEN SHAHN MURALS (page 21). Whichever one(s) you choose, you'll see me there!

MUSIC: Joe Uehlein's May 3 BIRTHDAY TRIBUTE TO PETE SEEGER is a no-brainer: don't miss it our very own local roots rocker's tribute to a true American labor hero.

SPECIAL EVENTS: There are two very special events that come highly recommended. The first is the May 10 screening of REDES with performance of the film's score by the POSTCLASSICAL ENSEMBLE (PCE). Director Martin Scorcese calls this "A very special film" and the live performance by PCE is a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity. Be sure to show up for the pre-show discussion with PCE Artistic Director Joe Horowitz, Music Director Angel Gil-Ordones and Mexico based Roberto Kolb. The second is another two-for-the-price-of-one: "LOVE SONGS FROM THE LIBERATION WARS," preceded by the JOE HILL AWARDS. Though technically not part of either the LaborFest or DC Labor FilmFest, this is part of the Labor Heritage Foundation's annual Great Labor Arts Exchange, fellow labor arts organizers who have been toiling in this fertile field far longer than we have. Full event details can be found on our website (dclabor.org).

POETRY & BOOKS: Easy choices as we just have one event of each (as of presstime; check our website for latest additions): the May 6 POETRY AT WORK and May 12's "SO MUCH TO DO" book club; the book club events are consistently interesting and the poetry event breaks exciting new ground for us.


FILM: I've saved this category for last because it's the biggest and the hardest, with way too many excellent choices. Seriously, because this year's FilmFest line-up is a "best of the fest" from past years, every film is terrific. So forgive me if I cheat a little and give you a reason to see each one: FASANELLA: goes perfectly with the exhibit; SALT OF THE EARTH: great classic celebrates its 60th anniversary this year; FIGHT IN THE FIELDS: better than the new Chavez film; REDES (see above under Special Events); NOTE BY NOTE: inspiring ode to craftsmanship; DIRTY PRETTY THINGS: brilliant performance by 12 Years A Slave's Chiwetel Ejiofor; MODERN TIMES: Charlie Chaplin's greatest!; TRASH DANCE: sanitation workers make their garbage trucks dance; MEN AT LUNCH: the fascinating story behind "Lunch Atop a Skyscraper"; FUN WITH DICK AND JANE: George Segal and Jane Fonda embark on a new career after George loses his job; OFFICE SPACE: we're raffling off a red stapler!; AT THE RIVER I STAND: Martin Luther King supports the strike by Memphis sanitation workers; BILLY ELLIOT: the sleeper hit that earned three Oscar nominations and spawned the long-running Broadway musical; BURN: the gripping story of a city struggling for survival, as seen through the eyes of its firefighters.



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Carrying It On: This Art Has a Hammer

At times it seems like American culture works methodically to erase working-class experiences, workplace relations, and stories of worker organization from popular memory. In the 1970s, the writer Paul Cowan discovered this tendency in a particularly poignant way. After reading about the heroic 1912



Lawrence textile strike, Cowan set out to track down Camella Teoli, who, as a fourteen-year old textile worker had become one of the most famous participants in the historic "bread and roses" strike. Camella became a cause célèbre in 1912 when she recounted to a congressional investigating committee how a power loom had caught hold of her hair and partially scalped her and almost took her life. Her testimony made headlines around the country, elicited sympathy for her fellow strikers, and helped them win their demands. When Cowan looked for her 60 years later, he discovered that she had recently died but that her daughter still lived in Lawrence. When Cowan finally met Camella's daughter, she was surprised to discover that her mother had been a striker in 1912 and that she had once testified before Congress. She didn't know the story behind that bald spot that her mother had always carefully fixed her hair to cover for all those years. Cowan was depressed to discover how much of the memory of the historic 1912 struggle was lost between generations.

It isn't difficult to imagine why Camella Teoli didn't talk much about her past with her daughter. Memories of poverty, humiliation, conflict, and discrimination that workers like Camella so often carried with them were sometimes too painful to recount. Talking about her association with the radical Industrial Workers of the World might have proven embarrassing in the years after the IWW was repressed for its radicalism by the U.S. government. And, like many working-class parents, Camella might have tried to shield her children from the harsh experiences of her life even as she struggled to make a better life for them.

Understandable personal decisions like these made by generations of workers, many of whom were marginalized by their immigrant status, become all the more significant in a broader culture that systematically functions to obscure the realities of social class. Many Americans don't like to acknowledge the existence of a working class. While politicians of all stripes celebrate the "great American middle class," even union allies tend to shy away from using the term "working class," preferring instead references to "working families." To even mention class risks being accused of waging "class war."

In such an environment, the preservation of working-class identity and labor culture requires conscious, intentional effort. Pete Seeger, whom we lost to old age earlier this year, certainly understood this. For more than seven decades the bard of American folk music worked to preserve in melody the voices and experiences of everyday people, their struggles and triumphs, their dreams and defeats—most of all their humanity. Thankfully Pete's lifelong mission lives on. As the films and performances of this year's DC Labor FilmFest and the new DC LaborFest will show, many are dancing along in their own way in Pete's footsteps. In image, word, song, and story they are keeping alive a democratic spirit woven deeply into working lives being lived all around us even now. To paraphrase Pete, this art has a hammer.

Joseph A. McCartin is an expert on U.S. labor, social and political history. A professor at Georgetown University's History Department, he directs Georgetown's Kalmanovitz Initiative for Labor and the Working Poor, which works to develop creative ideas and practical solutions for working people that are grounded in a commitment to justice, democracy, and the common good. His research and writing focuses on the intersection of labor organization, politics, and public policy; his most recent book is "Collision Course: Ronald Reagan, the Air Traffic Controllers, and the Strike that Changed America."



Ben Shahn built his mural "The Meaning of Social Security" around the words of Franklin Delano Roosevelt, giving pictorial form to the




President's June 8, 1934 address on the Social Security legislation: «This security for the individual and for the family concerns itself primarily with three factors. People want decent homes to live in; they want to locate them where they can engage in productive work; and they want some safeguard against misfortunes which cannot be wholly eliminated from this man-made world of ours.»


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

In his paintings, he portrays scenes from his own New York City working-class experience, as well as labor history events. Building interiors and exteriors, composites of city landmarks, ads, even newspaper headlines crowd together on his canvases, defying literal perspective, but making emotional and symbolic sense. Nearly always, active masses of people fill these cityscapes. This brief film provides an overview of Fasanella's early career, commentary on his style, and archival film footage from the time during which he painted and the events he portrayed. Fasa-



RALPH FASANELLA: LEST WE FORGET

Ralph Fasanella (1914-1997) celebrated the common man and tackled complex issues of



postwar America in colorful, socially-minded paintings. Ralph Fasanella: Lest We Forget celebrates the 100th anniversary of the artist's birth and brings together key works from a career spanning fifty-two years.

Born in the Bronx, Fasanella grew up in the working-class neighborhoods of New York and became a tireless advocate for laborers' rights, first as a union organizer and later as a painter. Fasanella took up painting in 1945, working in the garment industry, as a truck driver, ice delivery man,

union organizer and gas station owner before devoting himself to painting full-time in the 1970s. Untrained as an artist, Fasanella developed an astute and accessible style that reflected his affiliation with and commitment to the working class. He viewed painting as an extension of his union activity and his alternately subtle and brash paintings functioned simultaneously as memorial documents, didactic tools, and rallying cries, making the possibility of a better society palpable to his own community and others like it. These paintings, often large in scale and laden with symbolic imagery, deal with themes of struggle, endurance, social justice, family and community. He felt strongly about the need to remember the sacrifices of previous generations, inscribing the phrase "Lest We Forget" on several of his paintings. As early as 1947, Fasanella was exhibited alongside the top social realist painters of the day. His works hung in both galleries and union halls and effectively bridged a divide between socially-aware, self-taught artists and their trained counterparts. Among the 27 artworks on display are two major paintings from the museum's permanent collection. Iceman Crucified #4 (1958) is a tribute to Fasanella's father and a recent gift to the museum from the artist's estate. In Modern Times (1966) the artist champions humanistic values in an increasingly technological modern world. This centennial tribute marks the first time both paintings will be on public display at the museum.
