Community Services Agency Executive Director Kathleen McKirchy reported on several upcoming events:

 Labor Night at the Nats, July 29; tickets are still available, with Iron Workers 5 set to throw out the first ball unless another local buys more than 500 tickets. Any local buying 50 or more tickets gets their name on the big screen.

- **Golf tournament,** September 26; looking for more volunteers to help plan. Both events are fundraisers for the Emergency Assistance Fund.
- **Prison Book Drive:** CSA is coordinating a book drive for area prison libraries suffering budget cuts. Most people in prison usually get out someday and return to the community," said McKirchy.

 "Anything we can do to help them prepare for re-entry while they are still inside is a worthwhile venture."

Union Cities Coordinator Chris Garlock reported:

- National Nurses United/ Washington Hospital Center: nurse Geri Lee reported that NNU is back in negotiations at WHC but the administration canceled the union's strike vote in retaliation for distribution of a leaflet exposing safety concerns at the hospital and with little progress made thus far, picketing is planned for 5/6, 9, 16 & 23
- UNITE HERE Local 25: successful conclusion to the nineand-a-half week strike by workers at the Madison. Not only did the workers get their jobs back – or a generous buyout offer – but the hotel management agreed to a "me-

too" provision so they'll have to abide by what's agreed to by the rest of the DC hotels under the master hotel agreement.

- DC At-Large campaign: update on coordinated campaign supporting Labor Council endorsee Vincent Orange; vote is tomorrow and with low turnout expected, labor's endorsement/turnout is expected to be a critical factor.
- 2011 Annapolis Session: characterized as the "least productive" ever, as labor was forced to fight a number of "purely defensive" battles against anti-worker legislation that had no chance of passage in the Assembly or signature by the Governor.
- Montgomery County: updated on the MAPS effort and plans to develop strategies to confront the attacks on public sector workers.
- Prince George's County:
 Mel Franklin, new Prince
 George's County Councilmember, has five bills that
 labor is interested in, and
 that comprise the "Omnibus
 Economic Development"
 package. PG COPE to resume.
- **Tri-County**: Regular Meeting Tuesday, 4-26-11; Jim Lowery also reported on efforts by Building Trades in Prince George's County.

Reports of Affiliates - Johnny Walker, AFGE 383: Reported on coalition opposing Department of Youth

Rehabilitation Services nomination; also confirmed that Public Employee Relations Board has recommended that fired labor leader Robert Mayfield be reinstated to his city job.

- Desmond Serrette, Staff Person for Congresswoman Donna Edward: reported that Dennis Serrette's (CWA) retirement party will be this Friday at CWA headquarters.
- The DC Labor Chorus then performed several songs for the delegates to promote their upcoming Spring Concert, with organizer Elise Bryant promising "You ain't heard nothin' yet!"
